WHICH OF GOV. ROMNEY'S POSITIONS WILL HE ADAMANTLY DENY TONIGHT?

The main question about tonight's debate is not whether the Republican candidates demand the President remove the trigger compelling Congress to act to reduce the deficit – we know they will. The main question is which of Governor Romney's positions will he adamantly deny?

In 2008 Romney said: "Barack and Hillary have made their intentions clear regarding Iraq and the war on terror: They would retreat, declare defeat. And the consequence would be devastating."

In 2007 Romney attacked Obama for promising to end the war in Iraq, saying "Thank heavens Barack Obama wasn't President. We'd have been out of there and al Qaeda would have been dancing in the streets."

In recent weeks, Romney released a foreign policy agenda that failed to outline a mission for our troops in Iraq or a timetable for withdrawal – leaving them there indefinitely. And Romney attacked the President for keeping his promise to end the war in Iraq.

Will that same Mitt Romney show up tonight? Or will he do what he has done on so many other issues and reinvent himself before our eyes?

In a recent debate, Romney flipped on payroll tax cuts which he had called "little bandaids," saying he "didn't want to raise taxes on people in the middle of a recession." In South Carolina, he told veterans he wanted to inject "private sector competition" into the VA health care system and offer and vouchers to vets for their health care, but just yesterday, he said he had doesn't have "any proposal of that nature."

But this penchant for changing positions is of particular concern on matters of national security. A Commander-in-Chief only gets one chance to get it right. But Mitt Romney has been on all sides of the key foreign policy issues facing our nation today:

- Mitt Romney's tough on China campaign rhetoric is nothing but empty, because when
 the President stood up for American workers and enforced trade laws against China,
 Romney wrote in his book: "President Obama's action to defend American tire
 companies from foreign competition may make good politics by repaying unions for
 their support of his campaign, but it is decidedly bad for the nation and our workers.
 Protectionism stifles productivity."
- On Libya, Romney gave a series of convoluted statements supportive and critical of military action, and for and against the removal of Qaddafi.
- On Afghanistan, while declining to outline his own strategy to wind down the war, Romney has been for and against a timetable to withdraw our troops.
- Romney criticized the President for making clear he would go after terrorists in Pakistan if the Pakistanis couldn't or wouldn't a strategy that ultimately resulted in the elimination of Osama bin Laden.

Past is never present with Mitt Romney -- he will say and stand for anything to win. The only surprise tonight will be if Mitt Romney doesn't deny his record on another key issue.

'I'm a little surprised that, having made Afghanistan the center of his anti-terrorist strategy, he says he doesn't have a strategy at this stage for what to do in Afghanistan,' Romney says of the president. 'I would have expected him to have accomplished that by this point.' As Romney sees it, Obama has a choice. He can go along with Gen. Stanley McChrystal's expected request for more troops, or he can betray his own campaign promise of a firm U.S. stand in Afghanistan. 'I think his only choice, and the correct choice, is the former,' Romney says. But it might not be

that simple. When I ask Romney, 'What would you have done?' he seems slightly off-balance. 'I'm not in that position,' Romney says. He pauses a moment. 'When you say, what would I have done, I, I – 'Do you think we needed a new strategy in Afghanistan?' I ask. 'I'm going to Afghanistan and Iraq in a couple of months,' Romney says. 'I'll get an assessment of what's happening there and what the prospects are. But I certainly would support our troops with the additional troops which are being called for by General McChrystal, and provide the equipment and the manpower and the budgetary support which our troops deserve.'" ROMNEY FLIP-FLOPPED ON WITHDRAWING TROOPS FROM AFGHANISTAN

FLIP: Romney: "It Is My Desire And My Political Party's Desire To Support The People Of Afghanistan And Not To Leave." "Although the media have not been invited to his events, a glimpse into Romney's thinking was provided by an individual who attended the meeting between Romney and the young Afghans and who allowed a reporter to view a video of the event. ROMNEY CRITICIZED THE PRESIDENT FOR SAYING HE WOULD TAKE UNILATERAL ACTION

AGAINST TERRORISTS IN PAKISTAN

Romney Said He Didn't Agree With Obama on Taking Unilateral Action Against Al Qaeda Targets in Pakistan. Republican presidential candidate Mitt Romney criticized Democrat Barack Obama on Friday for vowing to strike al Qaeda targets inside Pakistan if necessary as the Obama camp issued a strident defense of his plan. What had been an internecine foreign policy battle between rival Democrats Obama, an Illinois senator, and New York Sen. Hillary Clinton, spilled into the Republican arena in the heavily contested state of Iowa. 'I do not concur in the words of Barack Obama in a plan to enter an ally of ours... I don't think those kinds of comments help in this effort to draw more friends to our effort,' Romney told reporters on the campaign trail. Obama on Wednesday said if elected president in November 2008 he would be willing to launch military strikes against al Qaeda targets inside Pakistan with or without the approval of the Pakistani government of President Pervez Musharraf. 'If we have actionable intelligence about high-value terrorist targets and President Musharraf won't act, we will,' Obama said." [Reuters, 8/4/07]
